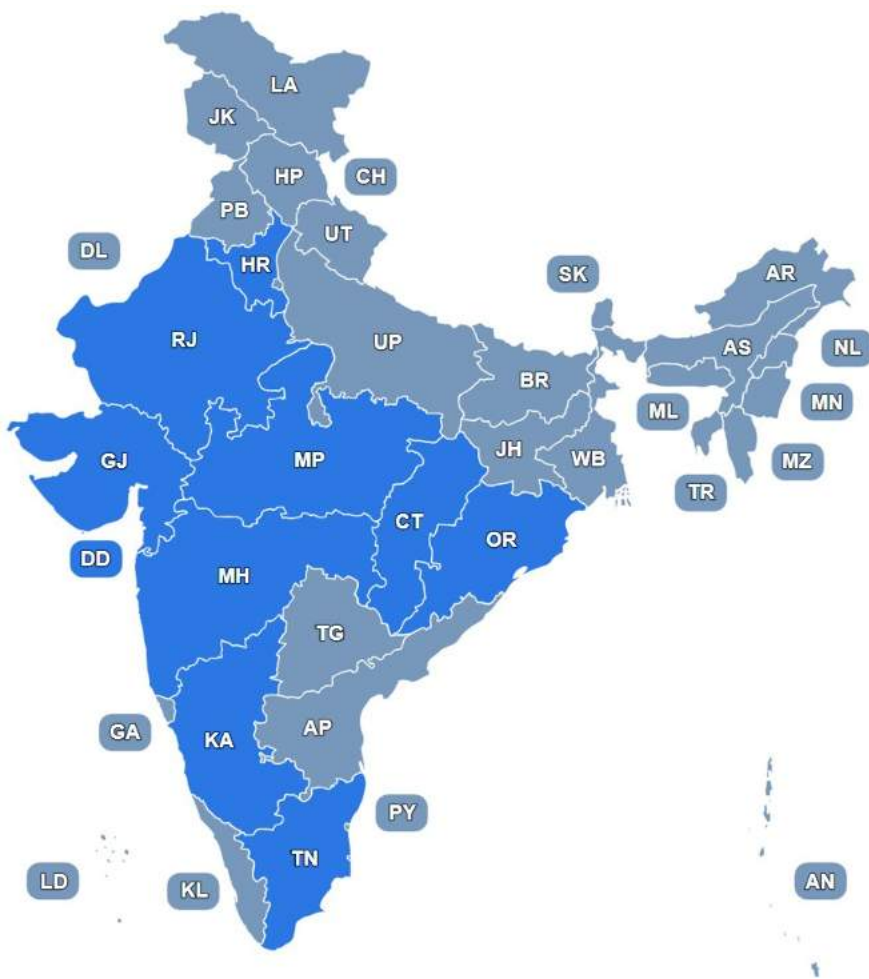

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROJECTS



Project Saksham

Advanced Tailoring and Garment Construction Skills Training

Project Saksham was launched as a collaboration between IDFC FIRST Bank and its implementation partner, Animedh Charitable Trust, with the aim of offering vocational training to women from underserved communities, thereby enabling their financial independence. The project employed two primary strategies to achieve this goal: providing training in advanced tailoring and organizing capacity-building workshops to foster entrepreneurship.

Project Saksham began its journey in 2016 and has successfully operated for five years across three tailoring training centers in Mumbai, Maharashtra. The initiative's goal is to offer ongoing support to program participants, focusing on skill development and expanding their opportunities for generating income.

Project Saksham envisions to enhance tailoring skills and livelihood potential of women belonging to underserved communities through a systemic 'earn and learn' format to achieve the following objectives

Objectives

To upskill women by providing them comprehensive tailoring and stitching training, aimed at enhancing their livelihood opportunities and facilitating income generation.

To ensure a sustained behavioural change in women, through the capacity building sessions aimed at instilling confidence, improving financial literacy, encouraging entrepreneurship, among others.

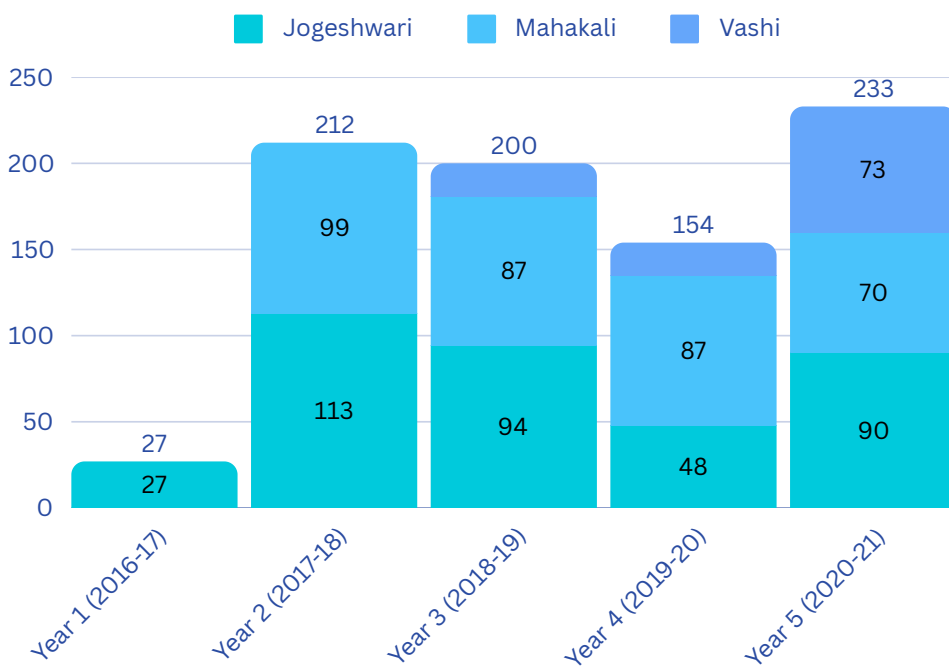
To foster agency of women and empower them to be changemakers in their communities.

Program Impact

Across the period from 2016 to 2022, three training centres of Project Saksham were established in Jogeshwari, Andheri (Mahakali), and Vashi. Over the five years, a total of **1,127** program participants graduated from Project Saksham across all locations.

STORIES THAT INSPIRE

SUSHILA

Sushila, who is 60 years old, learned about Project Saksham through a neighbor. She is a school dropout and has been a homemaker for her entire life.

When her husband fell seriously ill and their household income suddenly stopped, Sushila realized that she needed to step up and provide for her family.

She joined Project Saksham's Jogeshwari Centre, where she was offered an immediate earning opportunity from day one of the program.

Throughout her training, Sushila was able to earn money to support her family. Her earnings helped cover her husband's medical treatment and manage their household expenses.

Sushila appreciates that, beyond the financial support provided by Project Saksham, both her fellow participants and the staff were incredibly encouraging. She feels that they never let her feel isolated during this challenging time. The sense of family and belonging she experienced at the center helped her navigate one of the most difficult periods of her life.

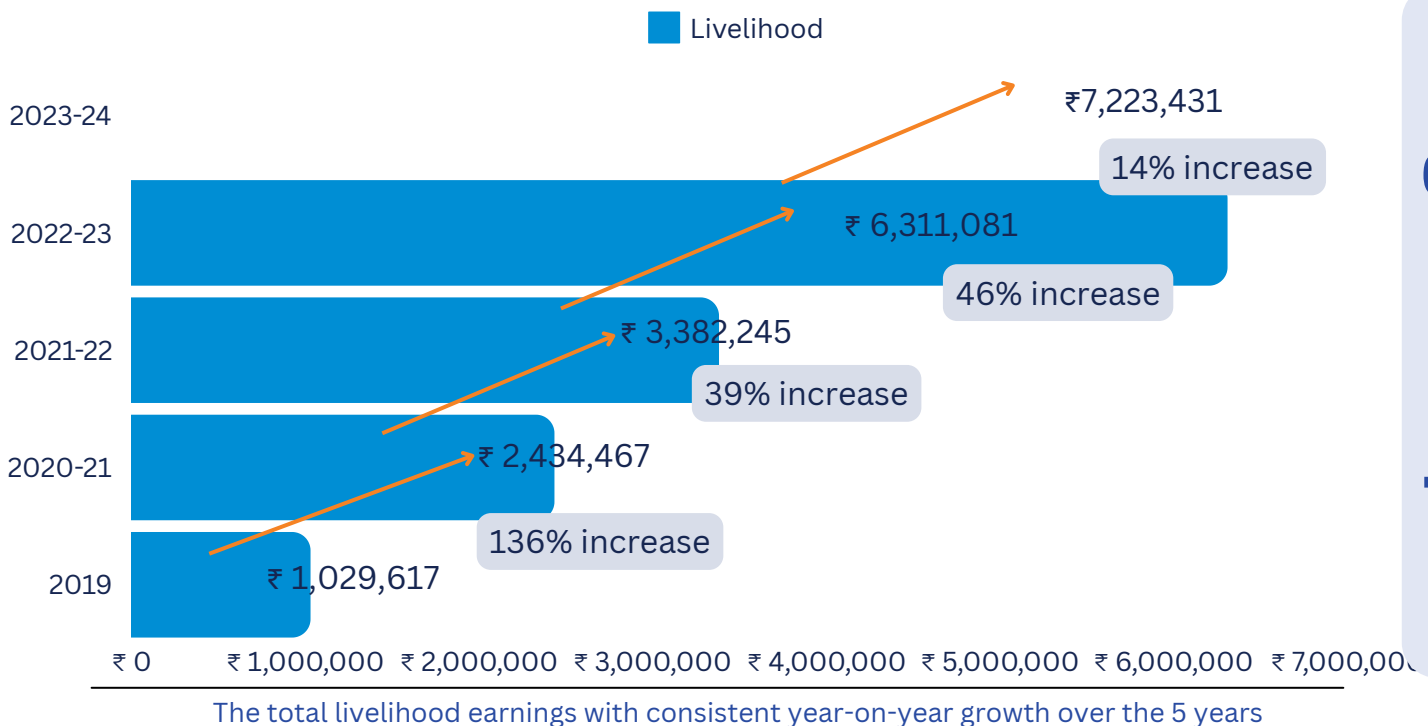
Income generation projects

ACT's income generation initiative is supported by Fondazione Pianoterra, Luxury Goods Retail Private Limited and Amal Embroideries Private Limited. It aims to create income opportunities for women skilled in tailoring through stitching, handwork, and embroidery. This innovative strategy connects artisans with various garment manufacturers and is grounded in the collaboration between ACT and 2nd Innings Handicrafts Pvt Ltd. This social enterprise operates the lifestyle brand I was a Sari.

In 2023-24, our efforts centred on producing samples, and enhancing artisans' skills with the help of embroidery and tailoring industry experts.

In May 2023, Our embroidery artisans, along with supervisor Kalpana, were presented with a wonderful opportunity to speak at an international Oxfam Festival in Italy, all thanks to our esteemed garment partner, I was a Sari.

By concentrating exclusively on festive orders, we have witnessed strong commitment and loyalty from our artisans, resulting in a **14%** increase in their livelihoods compared to the previous year.



Program Impact

The project, starting in a small space in the heart of Mumbai suburbs, now accommodates over **151** artisans. From a journey of ups and downs with making the women believe in themselves to seeing their **average monthly income increase to over 80%**, the story is nothing but a journey of strong resilient women who are now living a life of dignity and take pride in their work. From the local workshop to the global stage, our narrative is woven with the threads of collaboration, determination, and shared pride in overcoming societal barriers.



STORIES THAT INSPIRE

SONI

Meet Soni, who has been associated with ACT for the past two years. She is confident and straightforward, and we admire her determination to succeed and achieve financial independence. Soni left her studies after completing the 8th grade. After her marriage, she moved to Mumbai with her husband for work. She always dreamt of being financially self-reliant and soon began working with ACT under Project Donna.

Soni faced family challenges due to her inability to start a family; her in-laws often taunted her. Thankfully, her husband has been a supportive partner throughout this difficult time. Through counselling from our in-house professional, she learned to focus more on her work rather than the comments from her in-laws. With the income she earns, she saves at least 70% for her future and medical expenses.

Soni is not only a skilled tailor but also creates beautiful macramé bags and assists with fringe orders. She has an excellent record of minimal alterations and rejections. Additionally, she is one of the most reliable, committed, and highest-earning artisans at ACT.

Project Study Buddy

One-to-one Free Tutorship



The Study Buddy project is a distinctive after-school tutoring initiative currently operating in community centres across the ACT.

College students are enlisted to provide one-on-one tutoring for underprivileged school students, focusing primarily on essential subjects such as English, Mathematics, Science, and Computers. Volunteers conduct these sessions after school, two to three times a week, for one to two hours, aiming to enhance the student's academic performance. Those volunteers who fulfil the minimum service hours receive certificates in recognition of their contributions.

VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES



Project Mehek

Community Mental Health

Project Mehek focuses on the community mental health and emotional well-being of Children, Youth, and Women of Dadra Nagar Haveli. Community health workers focus on building a safe space and creating promotive and preventive mental health practices in vulnerable communities to work with children caregivers, youth, and women.

Our theory of change focuses on actively involving community members and stakeholders within the DNH ecosystem through initiatives that promote mental well-being, particularly for children, youth, and women. This engagement aims to enhance education and career opportunities for young people, foster a stronger family structure, and encourage social justice among the DNH community through positive collective efforts.

The tribal communities of Dadra & Nagar Haveli are affected by severe hardships. Theirs is a 5000-year-old legacy and they are cut off from the mainstream as they are 'shy of contact'. In the last few years, this union territory has become a hub of factories. The indigenous people are landowners and nature lovers and are conflicted with industrialization because it means economic prosperity, job opportunities and progress on one hand and loss of land, pollution, and change in lifestyle adversely impacting the social fabric of the ethnic people on the other hand.

Children, youth and women in this region are the most vulnerable and afflicted by poverty, violence and alcoholism and have been cut off from development and progress. They face significant gender inequality and have been identified as being highly oppressed and distressed due to lack of education, social issues and lack of livelihood opportunities.

Key Achievements:

- **School-Based Mental Health Interventions:** Reached nearly **1,000** children across 14 schools in Amboli and Kherdi. Outcomes included improved emotional expression, school engagement, attendance, creativity, and mental health awareness.
- **Community Outreach Events:** Hosted 'Jhankaar' to showcase children's mental health (MH) learnings. It gained significant attention, inspiring replication in other villages.
- **Collaboration with Government Psychiatry Department:** Promoted Telemanas helpline for MH support in nine villages. The team provided counselling and disseminated MH support resources.

Program Impact

Mehek's focus on promotive and preventive Mental Health (MH), particularly for children, has established a foundation for long-term well-being in the community. MH workers created trusted emotional safe spaces, contributing significantly to reducing MH distress and risks of escalation.

STORIES THAT INSPIRE

PRIYANKA

9-year-old Priyanka lives in Nibla Parzai Patil Pada with her parents and brother. Her home is characterized by frequent incidents of violence, addiction, and arguments. When I first visited Priyanka's family, I was shocked by the state of their home. It was dirty and unkempt, and there was no sense of peace. Priyanka herself was withdrawn and silent.

I began visiting Priyanka's home once a week to build a relationship with her. I played games and did activities with her, even though she didn't respond at first. One day, her sister-in-law was present during one of our visits, and she encouraged Priyanka to speak up. With her sister-in-law's support, Priyanka began to open up to me. She told me about the problems in her home and how they were affecting her ability to go to school. I was worried about her, but I was also determined to help her. I continued to visit Priyanka regularly, and I brought different games and activities each time.

Over time, Priyanka began to participate more and more. She started to answer questions, give her voice, and help other children. Today, I am so proud of Priyanka. She is ready to go to school on her own, she stays clean, and she is no longer afraid to speak up. She is a shining example of the power of resilience and the importance of having someone who cares”.

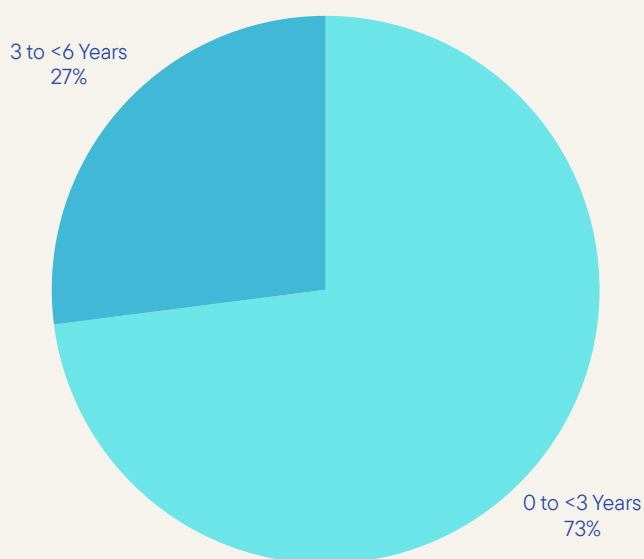
Early Childhood Development & Disabilities support to vulnerable children of ages between 0 – 6 years

ACT started working in Dadra Nagar Haveli among underserved adivasi communities in the year 2017. Women empowerment project Samruddhi and children's after school project Sakshartaa were doing well bringing financial empowerment to women and education support to children. In 2018, we invited knowledge partner-Ummeed CDC and jointly, we observed that there were gaps and certain social and systematic issues that needed to be addressed urgently if children and their families needed to benefit long term from the work that ACT was doing in the community. After doing an intensive need-based assessments, we came to prioritise on early childhood which needed to be addressed if we aimed for a deep rooted impact in the community.

We started working with children of ages between 0 – 6 years of age in order to address early delays and disabilities which is rampant in DNH because of lack of resources and parental education on child development. We have trained 4 members from the community to become Child Development Aides (CDA). More than 590 children and families have been impacted by the interventions promoting early childhood development and therapeutic support to delayed or disabled children, close to their homes.

Within this endeavour, six dedicated "Child Development Aides" (CDAs) collaborate with children and families, focusing on the age group of 0 to 6 years. 830 children are actively engaged and received support from CDAs between April 2023 and March 2024.

Moreover, the initiative extends its reach to 900 more children with the involvement of eleven "Early Childhood Champions" (ECC) and one Project Coordinator, focusing on children aged 0 to 3 years across ten villages: Velugaon, Amboli, Parzhai, Kala, Karjgaon, Kherdi, Khanvel, Khutli, Rudana, and Tinoda. The project emphasizes comprehensive child development, language development, intellectual, physical, self-help, emotional, and mental aspects. To achieve these objectives, CDAs and ECCs facilitate opportunities for over 1700 children and families, including visits to record observations through 'Look, Ask, Listen' (LAL), therapy sessions, and Growth Monitoring and Communication Development (GMCD).

Program Impact

The project includes 830 children within CDA and 900 within ECC initiatives. A total of 1730 children have been impacted under Project Nanhe Kadam.

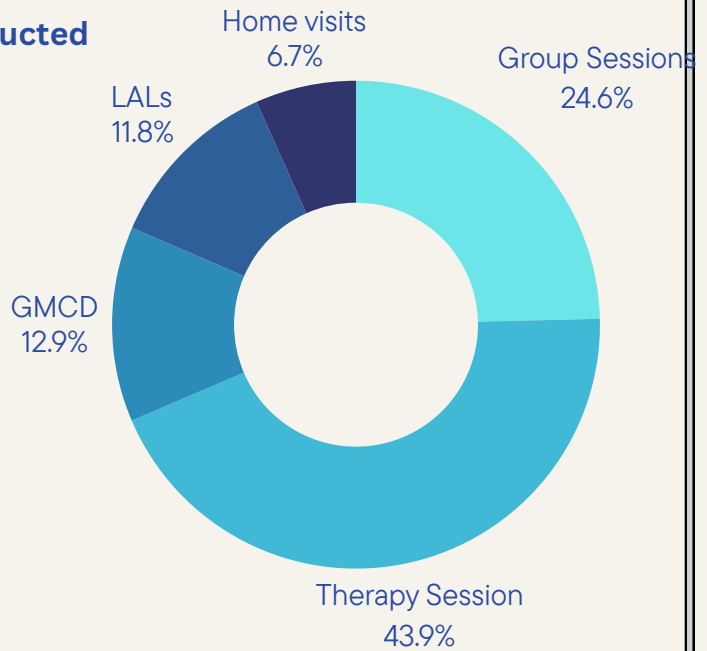
Child Development Aide activities:

This program directly benefits 830 children and indirectly supports approximately 800 families. Among these children, around 45% are facing challenges related to malnutrition, developmental delays, and disabilities.

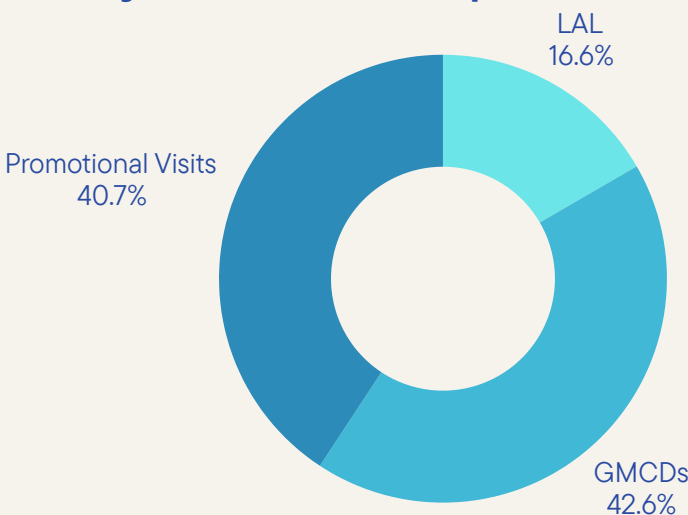

STORIES THAT INSPIRE

VAISHNAVI

Vaishnavi, a 2.7-year old girl, lives with her joint family in Velugam - Barafpada. Her father, a farmer, supplements the family's income by working as a laborer at a nearby company during the non-agricultural season.

The family's total monthly income ranges between Rs. 12,000 and Rs. 15,000. In early January 2023, during a home visit, our Community Health Worker (CHW) identified that Vaishnavi was experiencing a delay in speech. Despite this, the initial observation noted that she had a good understanding of language and demonstrated proficiency in sports, as well as fine and gross motor skills. Following this, the CHW referred Vaishnavi to our Child Development Aide and Support (CDAS) team, which began working with her on January 4, 2023.

After conducting a thorough assessment, the CDA set up short-term goals and discussed a milestone and therapy plan with Vaishnavi's caregiver. Within two months of regular intervention, Vaishnavi was able to speak one sentence and six words. As she reached her first milestone, the team progressed to the next goal.

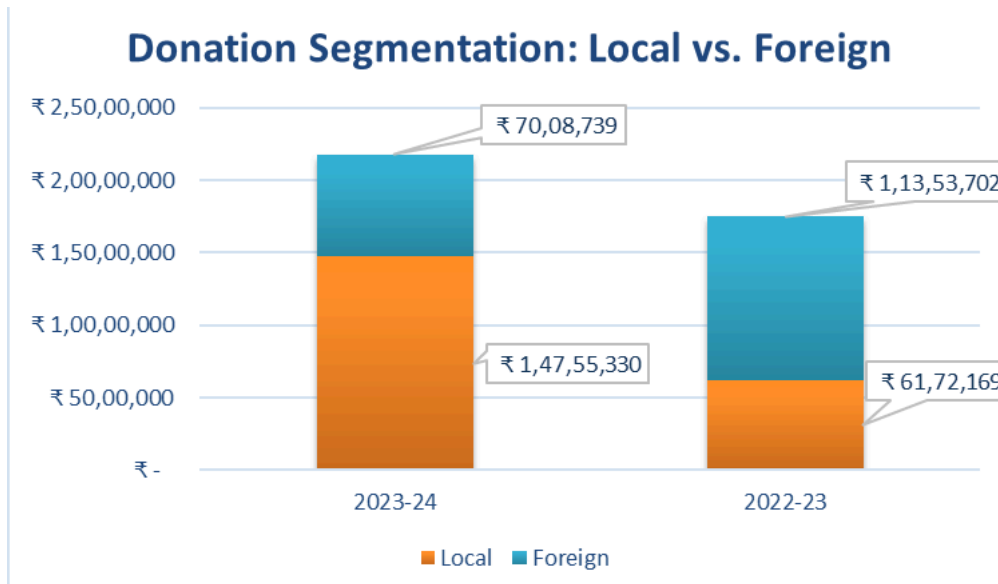
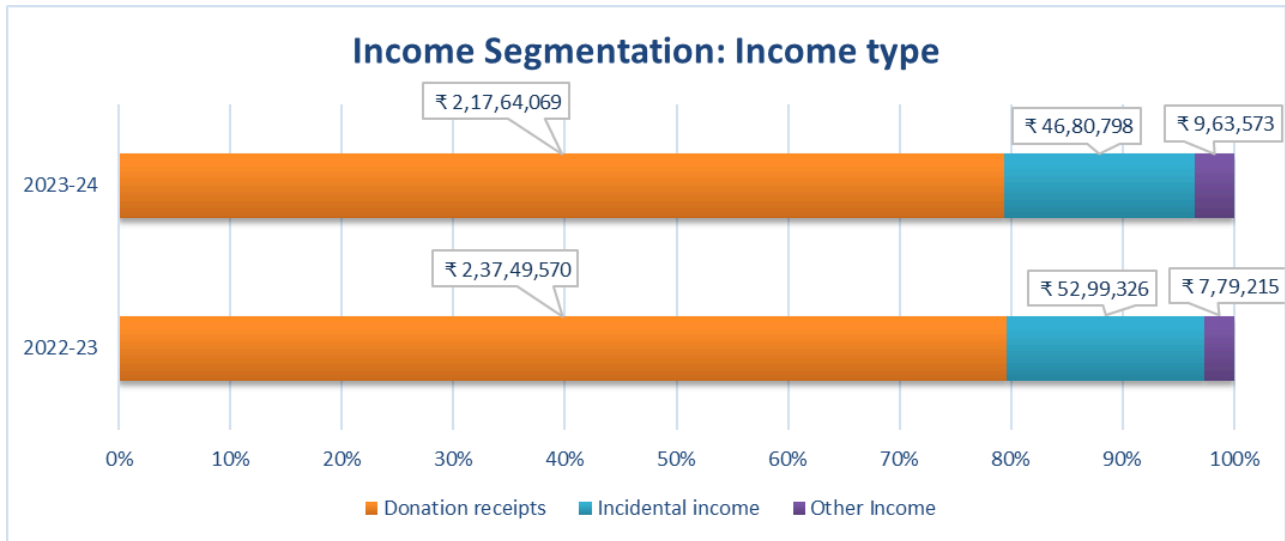
By the end of six months (totalling 32 sessions), Vaishnavi was able to recognize and speak the names of animals in Warli, the local language of Dadra and Nagar Haveli, including words like "ball," "peacock," "aaya," "dadi," "de," "popat," "kavala," and "kombda," and could count Numbers from one to ten. Over the span of one year, Vaishnavi has progressed remarkably and is now able to speak complete sentences. Her speech and overall development are on par with typically developing children of her age.
